Community Spay/Neuter Vouchers

FoCCAS is proud to offer \$25 off discount vouchers for spay/neuter surgeries. Residents of Colleton County may pick up vouchers at the shelter and also at our monthly Adopt-A-Thons. Vouchers may be used at the local vet offices and at SNAC in Ridgeland. Each month, FoCCAS allots 30 vouchers and each voucher must be used within 45 days. Funding for this program came from Paws At The Plantation 2.

FoCCAS is committed to encouraging owners to have their pet spayed or neutered. The Colleton County Animal Shelter takes in many litters of unwanted puppies and kittens each month, many of whom will not be adopted. The overpopulation of unwanted pets in Colleton County causes the shelter to be unnecessarily beyond capacity.

Transports to Maine: Searching for Volunteers

As you all know, our transports to Maine have saved the lives of more than 150 puppies, kittens, and small dogs that would have been euthanized at our shelter. This project involves many volunteers including foster families and transport organizers to keep records of all the animals.

FoCCAS is currently looking for foster families to commit to taking care of puppies or kittens for six to eight weeks. Animals can be fostered individually or several can be fostered in the same home. FoCCAS will pay for vet appointments, vaccines, any medicine, and food. Foster families provide the home and love.

FoCCAS is also looking for at least one person with good organizational skills to help keep track of the animals’ vet appointments, vaccines, and general health.
